THE DRIVE

My wife and I were both born and raised in the country, near the town of Dawson, Texas, on a blackland farm. We both were in the graduating class of 1948, from Dawson Highschool, were married in October of 1948 and farmed for the first years of our mariage. We had grown up, both in families that went to Corsicana for a lot of the family shopping.

Where we lived, we traveled old Highway 31, which was later replaced by a new Highway 31 to the north side of Dawson and ran a more direct route from Corsicana to Waco. The old road then was renamed as a new farm-to-market road. It was the travel up this old road that has remained in my memory. I can remember the many farms, the houses, the buildings, going across the bridge over the creek, and I still remember passing a really nice home, which may have been built by one of the men that had made it big in the old oil boom days. I, as a boy, was impressed by the sight of one great car

that appeared from time to time in front of the beautiful home which was protected by a long white wooden fence with a gate directly in front of the house, and where one of the first Lincoln "Mark 1" automobiles would park for all of the world to see. I loved seeing this great car and dreamed about having one of my own, when I grew up.

A few more miles down the road we would come to the last survivors of bygone eras of the oil boom days of 1894. The Corsicana oil boom was the first discovery of oil in Texas. This discovery put the town on the map. As we had come in, we had passed old oil pumps still pumping that black gold, some sat closed while others pumped, we would come to the area where there sat rows upon rows of large storage tanks. I was at this time in my life, never really aware of the really historical background of what I was seeing, and the place in history that this entire area held in its past.


The oil boom was not the only contributor to history, but only one of many, some of which remain.



THE OIL FIELDS

Corsicana was established in 1848 to serve as the seat of government for Navarro County, which the first Texas legislature had created two years earlier. The county was named after Jose Antonio Navarro, a Texas patriot. When asked what the new town should be called, Navarro replied, "Call it Corsicana after the island of Corsica, the birthplace of my father." Corsicana was a typical post-Civil War cotton town in the black lands of northeast central Texas. The city first adopted its Home Rule Charter in 1917 and last amended in May 2007.

Oil Fields

In 1894, oil was discovered by accident only blocks from Corsicana's business district as drillers were completing an artesian well to expand the city's water supply. Within six years, 500 oil wells operating within the city limits were producing 800,000 barrels of crude annually, making Corsicana the site of the first commercial oil field in Texas.

Today the more than 26,000 residents of Corsicana take great pride in their rich history.

"Firsts" of Corsicana

Other historic information concerning the many "firsts" taking place in Corsicana include:

Corsicana is where oil was first discovered west of the Mississippi, thus Corsicana became the first Texas oil boom town, and one of Texas' wealthiest cities.

In 1898, the state's first oil refinery was built by a new local company called Magnolia Petroleum Company (known today as Mobil). This made it the first Texas oil boom town, and one of Texas' wealthiest cities.


The Texas Company (Texaco) began shortly thereafter.

Corsicana was one of the first cities in Texas to use natural gas for lighting and fuel.

Lyman T. Davis first delivered his famous chili in downtown Corsicana in 1895. He started canning his chili in 1921 and named it "Wolf Brand" after his pet wolf. A picture of the wolf is still found on the label to this day. The company is now owned by ConAgra Foods.

As I run these memories through my mind, I can remember the other, now famous, things about Corsicana that have survived time.

As we continue our drive from our home near Dawson along old highway 31 to Corsicana, we have gone through the remains of the old oil fields and now are about to enter the historical area of Corsicana. This history has been well written and documented by historians for years. There are many websites for those of you who are history buffs, and would be well worth your time for a visit to them





During the glory years of the oil boom and the years that followed, it was said that Corsicana was home for the most millionaires in the state.

It also was the home of the Oil City Steelworks, a brick making company, a Dr. Pepper plant, and a cotton mill, was the center for cattle sales and many other businesses that served the farming and cattle economy.






THE COLLIN STREET BAKERY



The bakery was founded in 1896 by August Wiederman, an immigrant from Wiesbaden, Germany.[2] With the help of local entrepreneur Tom McElwee, the bakery soon outgrew its original building, and required a new one in which the second floor was turned into a hotel. Celebrities such as Enrico Caruso and Will Rogers were sighted at the bakery, and in 1914 the Ringling Brothers Circus passed through town and ordered dozens of fruitcakes as Christmas gifts to be mailed to friends and family across the globe. In this way, the bakery entered the mail-order business. Lee William "L. W." McNutt, Sr. (1895-1972), Harry Cook, and Bob Rutherford purchased the bakery in 1946 from August Wiederman.

WOLF BRAND CHILI. In 1895 Lyman T. Davis of Corsicana developed the original recipe for Wolf Brand Chili, which he sold for five cents a bowl from the back of a wagon parked on the streets in downtown Corsicana. He later opened a meat market in Corsicana where he sold his chili in brick form, using the brand name of Lyman's Famous Home Made Chili. In 1921, using the simplest he began canning his chili machinery, marketing it in the immediate area. It was about that time that he adopted the brand name "Wolf Brand," in honor of his pet wolf, Kaiser Bill. By 1923, with improved equipment, Davis had increased production to 2,000 cans of chili per day. Because of the discovery of oil on his farm, he had neither the

time nor the interest to devote to his chili business. and in 1924 he sold his operations to I. C. West and Fred Slauson, two Corsicana businessmen. The new owners modernized production and introduced new marketing techniques. Among the most successful innovations introduced by West and Slauson were Model T Ford trucks with cabs shaped like cans and painted to resemble the Wolf Brand label. A live wolf was caged in the back of each truck. The vehicles provided practical transportation onlv company salesmen but also were effective traveling advertisements for their products. In 1954 the company expanded into interstate markets, having previously distributed its products only in Texas. The included New Mexico. Louisiana. new markets Arizona, Oklahoma, and Arkansas. In 1957 Quaker Oats of Chicago purchased Wolf Brand from Dovle and James West, sons of J. C. West. Quaker Oats continued to operate the Corsicana plant as a separate division of the company, leaving Davis's original recipe unchanged. In 1977 Wolf Brand, along with other chili manufacturers, successfully legislature the Texas to have proclaimed the official "state food" of Texas. In an effort to consolidate its operations. Ouaker Oats closed the Corsicana plant in 1985 and merged its operations with another subsidiary, Stokley-Van Camp, in Dallas.

Third generation hot tamale makers, the brother's grandfather, the late Nathan Carpenter, created the original recipe. Their father, the late Willie Carpenter passed it down to them.

"This is the only place in Navarro County that you can get hot tamales made from the original recipe created by my grandfather," Bill proudly said.

Carpenter noted that it takes approximately five hours to prepare hot tamales. Wrapped in parchment paper, each hot tamale is a tasty combination of meal and meat specially seasoned with Carpenter's secret touch.

Fanciers will be able to buy hot tamales by the dozen between 11 a.m. and 10 p.m. Monday through Saturday. "We are specializing in drivein window service," Bill said.

Like grandfather, like father and now, like son, aptly describes the tradition of making hot tamales in the Carpenter family. Stop by today and pick up several dozen. Excellent for lunch or dinner, or appetizers, you'll enjoy a Carpenter hot tamale prepared from the original recipe and "tender loving care."




